How will changes in the energy industries impact relations between countries?

Access to oil and gas has long held an influence over the politics of individual nations and their relations with others. But as more countries move toward sustainable energy, and supply chain shortages affect the availability of oil and gas, how will this change the way in which the United States interacts with the outside world? The tournament will run March 15 - April 2. More details to come.




Scholarship Applications Open, Deadline March 1—Jackie Littleton, Chair

Unless you have a student currently in college, you may not know what higher education costs these days. Here are some facts:

- Nationwide: in-state tuition at a public university in 2022 averaged \$6,476 for tuition and fees and \$21,230 for living expenses.
- **Tyler Junior College:** \$2,962 for tuition and fees and 53% of their students received grants and scholarships totaling \$4.635.
- **UT Tyler:** \$9,596 for tuition and fees and 60% of their students received grants and scholarships totaling \$7903
- Texas A&M: \$13,239 for tuition and fees; 62% of their students received grants and scholarships totaling \$9,793
- **SMU:** \$60,236 for tuition and fees; 71% of their students received grants and scholarships totaling \$344,874.

For the 2022-23 school year, AAUW Tyler Fund will award a total of \$6,000 to six very deserving graduates of Smith County public high schools. In other words, each young

woman will receive \$500 from us each semester she is enrolled in college. Before you tear your hair and wish we could give more, let me share with you what one of the girls told me. "It was more than the money. It was seeing all those educated women sitting around the tables at lunch who believed in me."

AAUW TEXAS PRIORITIES FOR 88TH LEGISLATIVE SESSION – SCHEREL CARVER, PUBLIC POLICY CHAIR

The AAUW Texas Public Policy Committee took recommendations from the recent member survey to hire a lobbyist from the HillCo Agency to work with us during the legislative session from January through May. Her name is **Kate Kuhlmann**.

In a December 1st dynamic Zoom program Kuhlmann explained what her role would be. Kate and the staff at HillCo will generate reports for us during the 88th Texas Legislative Session, which starts January 10, 2023.

Members' most important issues were the following:

- Women's health issues
- Reduction in gun violence
- Improved monitoring of workplace sexual harassment
- Open and fair elections broadly accessible to all voters
- Opposition to censorship of books in classrooms and libraries
